



Progress overview

The Keeping Children Safe Reform Program Quarterly Report covers:

- the Government's Response to the 191 recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry into the Tasmanian Government's Responses to Child Sexual Abuse in Institutional Settings (Commission of Inquiry).
- the 30 interim actions announced by the Tasmanian Government prior to the finalisation of the Commission of Inquiry's report.

The Government's Response to the Commission of Inquiry is divided into three phases:

- Phase 1: Ended 30 June 2024
- Phase 2: Runs until 30 June 2026 (current focus)
- Phase 3: Will end 30 June 2029

What's the current status?

- 46 recommendations (24 per cent of the total) have been completed so far
- 28 out of 30 interim actions are now finished

We are in the early stages of Phase 2 of the Government Response. Progress is being made across a wide range of recommendations (see progress highlights following).

Just over 17 months since the Commission's report was released, 46 recommendations have been completed. This is almost one quarter of all recommendations.

Current actions – progress update for period 1 November 2024 to 31 January 2025

107 Phase 2 recommendations are currently being worked on.

Listening to children and young people and victim-survivors

- A new group called the Victim-Survivor Advisory Group has been formed. This group will have their first meeting in early 2025 and will give those who have experienced abuse the opportunity to inform policy (recommendation 19.5).
- The Department of Health is adding new members to its Young People Advisory Group. Expressions of interest recently closed and new members will start in early 2025 (recommendation 15.10).
- The <u>Child and Youth Empowerment Team</u>
 in the Department for Education, Children
 and Young People continued work to
 uphold child rights, including through
 the development of its Participation and
 Empowerment Strategy and <u>Youth Voice</u>
 <u>Survey</u> for 12 to 17 year olds in out of home
 care (recommendations 9.6 and 12.8).

Improving engagement and support

 The Sexual Assault Support Service and Laurel House have been funded to support children and adult victim-survivors of child sexual abuse to get the support they need faster (recommendation 21.4).

Youth Justice Reform and Uplifting Care

- The new <u>Youth Justice Model of Care and its</u>
 <u>Implementation Plan</u> was released on
 10 December 2024 (recommendation
 12.18).
- An independent review of the trial of Body Worn Cameras at Ashley Youth Detention Centre was completed. (recommendation 12.17).
- Work progressed on the Child Safety and Out of Home Care Model of Care, and the Strategic Plan for the Out of Home Care System (and supporting action plan), with consultation set to occur in the first half of 2025 (recommendations 9.9 and 9.18).

Consultations on new Justice reforms

 The <u>Justice Legislation Amendment</u> (<u>Evidence and Integrity Commission</u> <u>Reforms</u>) <u>Bill 2024</u> was released for public consultation in late 2024.

Enhancing State Service culture and workforce

- The Department of Police, Fire and Emergency Management is delivering the inaugural Sexual Abuse Response and Investigation Course for specialist police officers (recommendation 16.3).
- Training on trauma-informed practices has been provided to legal practitioners at the State Litigation Office and law firms that are working on abuse in care litigation.
 New guidelines for this work will be shared publicly soon (recommendation 17.2).
- In January 2025, the Department for Education, Children and Young People updated and released two important training courses for all staff: Mandatory Reporting training and Child Sexual Abuse Awareness training (recommendation 6.4 and 6.5).
- The Department of Health developed a Child Safety and Wellbeing Training and Education Strategy in 2024, This strategy is now in final draft. It outlines ongoing knowledge and skill requirements for all staff, volunteers, students, and contractors to safeguard children and young people. (recommendation 15.15).
- The Department of Health is developing a new statewide Mandatory Reporting Protocol to improve child abuse reporting. The Mandatory Reporting Working Group was established in late 2024 to strengthen reporting practices (recommendation 15.15 and 15.6).

Ongoing actions

Three projects, related to five Phase 1 recommendations, were still in progress at the end of the reporting cycle, with agencies focused on ensuring they deliver all required outcomes to meet the Commission's intent. These are:

A new Commission for Children and Young People

 Feedback on the draft Bill closed on 15 December 2024. Responses are currently being considered (recommendations 18.4 and 18.6).

Professional conduct policies

 While these recommendations are almost complete, work to make the recommended changes to the State Service Act 2000 is ongoing (recommendations 20.2 and 20.4).

User friendly guide to complaints

 An interim Guide to Tasmanian Oversight Bodies, by the Offices of the Independent Regulator, Integrity Commission, Ombudsman, Registration to Work with Vulnerable People and the Commissioner for Children and Young People is in the final stages of development (recommendation 18.14).

In addition to progressing Phase 2 recommendations, agencies are to undertaking a range of actions to keep children safe. This includes work to refine and embed responses from Phase 1 and actions that go beyond the Commission's recommendations. Key actions from the past quarter include:

- The Tell Someone campaign was relaunched to strengthen child protection in Tasmania by equipping people to detect, respond to and act on signs of abuse.
- The first <u>Child Safety Reform</u>
 <u>Implementation Monitor</u> commenced and will play a critical role in overseeing reforms to keep children safe in Tasmania. The Monitor is already working with agencies to support reform efforts.
- The Department of Justice released <u>30</u>
 <u>Lessons and Counting</u>, a new creative
 resource showcasing critical lessons from
 the lived experience advisory panel.

- The Department of Health continues to embed child safety messaging and tools for staff and make messages more accessible for children and young people, including by engaging children, young people and staff in a range of interactive activities during Children's Week.
- Tasmania Police rolled out new <u>soft</u>
 <u>interview rooms</u>—purpose-designed spaces
 to enable victim-survivors to share their
 experiences in a safe, supporting setting.
- <u>Libraries Tasmania</u> is bolstering the safety of children and young people across our public library network, including through clearer signage and awareness-raising activities and improved training for staff.
- The Ashley Youth Detention Centre Young Person Consultation Group is providing a forum for children and young people in detention to form and express their views, make requests, raise questions and express concerns.
- The Voices for Tasmanian Youth
 Consultative Council co-created a
 <u>communications checklist</u> to help make
 government ensure its messages are
 meaningful, accessible and inclusive for
 children and young people.
- Agencies are continuing to review, update and communicate best-practice resources to workers, children and young people and the community including <u>guiding resources</u> <u>for safeguarding children and young people</u> by the Department for Education, Children and Young People, and <u>child safety and</u> <u>wellbeing resources and publications</u> by the Department of Health.
